I am reading a book by Joyce Rupp called, *"Praying Our Goodbyes."* My good friend, Pastor Larry Mancini recommended it to me and thought it would be very appropriate for me to read it at this time. If you haven't heard yet, I am retiring as Senior Pastor of the Patchogue Church of the Nazarene and will be moving to North Carolina in July.

The author of the book says that our journey in life is a pattern of hello – goodbye – hello; of life, death, and resurrection. Everyone has goodbyes – times of losing someone or something that has given meaning and value to life. She writes, "We may be harshly bruised by life's farewells, but it is possible to be healed. We can become whole again. I believe that if we are willing to move inside the heart of the experience, to live patiently through the process even as we acknowledge the difficult, painful emotions, we can experience the wonder of spiritual growth and the marvel of new depths of faith in our relationship with God and with others."

This *goodbye* for Ann and me has been difficult. It is hard to say goodbye to people and places, some that we've known all our life that have given meaning and value to our life. Yet, we look forward to being near (saying *hello*) to my son, daughter-in-law and grandson.

One morning, while reflecting on these things and praying, I read this in *"Praying Our Goodbyes,"* which encouraged me and gave me hope.

"Jesus was not spared the ache and the struggle of letting go ... because He was so fully human, so much like all of us who travel the hello-goodbye-hello pattern of the human journey. Continued from Front Cover

"Leave-taking was a familiar part of the last three years of His life. It began with a goodbye to almost thirty years of security in His hometown (Nazareth), where a tug inside of Him said, 'It's time you moved on.' It was time for Him to walk away from everyone and everything that He had known- His home, His family, His friends, His work, His favorite places of recreation, relaxation and prayer, His at-homeness with the town and the surrounding area.

"The walk away from His secure world took Jesus into a very significant rite of passage: His forty days in the desert where He said a prayerful farewell to all those years of Nazareth and came to terms with the letting go that was being asked of Him. He felt a power within Himself that pulled Him forth into a whole new world of ministry. Luke tells us that Jesus left the desert 'with the power of the Spirit in Him' (Lk 4:14). It was the power to say goodbye in order to say hello.

"It was the power working in Jesus and the ever-deepening love of His Father that enabled Jesus to walk..."

By the example of Jesus, the power of the Spirit and the ever-deepening love of the Father I am enabled to walk, to move on, allowing myself to develop new friendships, to love deeply, and to serve, knowing it will mean the price of farewell. Yet, by the resurrection of Jesus that we just celebrated on Easter, I know there is life even after death, there is something beyond our goodbyes. This is where my / our strength and hope lie.

I will miss you all very much. I will never forget you, I will never forget your love, and I will not stop praying for you.



Bowling and Heaven

Bowling can help us understand the Bible's message about salvation. A perfect score in bowling is 300. To get this you need to throw a strike in all ten frames plus the two extra balls at the end. If you leave any pins standing, your hope of a perfect game is shot.

Now, imagine that you're in a bowling contest and the prize for

bowling a perfect 300 in one game is a million dollars. If you find yourself in the middle of the game with several open frames and gutter balls, you have no hope of a 300. At that point it won't help to get serious and bowl perfectly from then on out. You can improve your score, but your chance of winning the prize is totally gone.

Many people treat their lives like a bowling game they are trying to salvage. We look back on our lives and realize that we have thrown a lot of gutter balls and left a lot of pins standing. We get convicted and realize that this isn't a score that we would want to bring before God one day. So we decide that from here on out were going to turn over a new leaf. We think that if we can get very serious and try for perfection from this time forward, we can salvage the final score and please God in the end.

We can't.

The truth is, God demands perfection. Jesus actually said this. He didn't say, "Try your best and it will be okay." Jesus said, "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48). James 2:10 states, "whoever keeps the whole law and yet stumbles at just one point is guilty of breaking it all." Only perfect is perfect. Yet, we have not been perfect. We've sinned, and trying hard from here on out can never erase the gutter balls in the frames of life we've already played.

Think of it another way. What if each of the ten frames were one of the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20:1-17). If that were the case, would you have a 300 game going? I know I don't. In fact, when I really think about God's commands, I don't think I've had a strike in any of them. Have you? Have you consistently kept God number one in your life (commandment #1)? Have you always honored Him with your words (#3) and your time (#4)? Have you ever told a lie, even a small one (#8)?

Maybe you're proud because you have a few strikes because you have never murdered someone (#6) or committed adultery (#7). Okay, but Jesus taught that if you hate someone you have murdered them in your heart (Matthew 5:21-22). As far as adultery, Jesus also said, "everyone who looks at a woman with lustful intent has already committed adultery with her in his heart" (Matthew 5:28). There go those strikes.

This is bad news because not only does our score fail to win the prize, but it also earns us a penalty. The Bible says that "the wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23). What we earn—what we deserve—from our life of sin is spiritual death—eternal punishment and separation from God.

That's the bad news. The good news is that Romans 6:23 goes on to say, "...but the gift of God is etenal life in Christ Jesus our Lord."

God demands perfection, but he knows that we're not going to be able to give it. We come into this life with a bad score from the first frame. To be right with God, He needed to make another way. That is why God came into this world.

Jesus Christ is the only human being to ever throw strikes in all ten frames. The Bible says that Jesus was tempted in every way, just as we are—yet was without sin (Hebrews 4:15). He always knocked down every pin and never left any standing. Jesus, the Son of God, was the only person to ever get the perfect 300. He is the only one to win the prize rather than the penalty.

When we look at the score board, we see our gutter balls and Christ's perfect game. The amazing thing is what Jesus offers to do for us. Jesus offers to switch scores.

The Bible states, "We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God. God made Him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Corinthians 5:20b-21). In effect, Jesus offers to erase His name from His score and to put your name there. In exchange, He agrees to claim your failed score. You get His prize. He takes your penalty. That is what the sinless Son of God was doing on the cross. The Lord died on the cross in the place of everyone who will trust Him as their substitute. Because of what Christ did, God is willing to look at you and see Christ's 300 rather than what you threw.

Will you turn to Him and accept Christ's offer? Or will you keep trying to get your own perfect score?

What would He rather see of me and of you? I think of the words of an old hymn ...

"When we walk with the Lord in the light of His word, what a glory He sheds on our way! While we do His good will, He abides with us still, and with all who will trust and obey.


Trust and obey, for there's no other way to be happy in Jesus, but to trust and obey."




I just recently finished packing a box filled with dresses and shorts headed for the Paradise Orphanage and sent them off

Conflict and Conviction

"...The works of the flesh are evident...hatred, discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions..." Galatians 5:20

I believed I had the right to speak my mind until someone else had the courage and integrity to tell me I was wrong and pointed out the hurt I had caused. Revisiting my words, God made me read them through His sad eyes. What I had said was out of line and void of respect or kindness. Writing an apology became a painful reminder of my insensitivity. Taking the time to get the words right- type, erase, type, also meant retyping the conviction levied against me by the Holy Spirit. *Wrong, disrespectful, unloving, unkind. <u>Guilty!</u>*

They had every right to refuse me and I was afraid they would. Where would that leave us both? In addition, Communion Sunday was coming and I was scheduled to serve. How could I while this was unresolved?

I sent the apology. An hour passed; nothing. While I so much wanted to hear back before going to bed a reply did not come. It was not a restful night.

What's The Difference?

"Put aside...wrath, anger...put on compassion, kindness, humility, and <u>forgiveness</u>..." Colossians 3:8, 12-13. "...and go...be <u>reconciled</u>..." Matthew 5:24.

Although the words seem the same they are quite different. Forgiveness, while difficult, is the easier of the two. We can forgive without reconciliation. We can forgive someone in secret with or without our ever telling them we've bestowed it and we may simultaneously never want to be in their presence at all. It's like saying, "I forgive you because I can't go around feeling like this, but I never want to cross paths with you because I'll be hurt all over again." Somewhere in our heart-home, we've made a little room for our hurts, grudges, pain, and resentments. We close the door but never lock it. Consciously or subconsciously, whenever we need to feed those emotions, we go to that room for food.

Reconciliation, on the other hand (come to think of it, reconciliation <u>is</u> the 'other hand') is much more difficult. Reconciliation can only happen openly, face to face. It is the high and loving companion to forgiveness; restoration in the complete sense of the word. No heart-room for harboring old hurts. Reconciliation makes eye contact. It genuinely smiles as it says to the other person, "I don't hold anything against you. My heart is free. It's in the past. Let's be at peace."

(Only the Lord can bring this kind of absolute healing to your battered heart. If you *really* want it, He'll do it!)

Forgiveness, Reconciliation, and Restoration

"The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, gentleness... 'Galatians 5:20

Early in the morning, I checked my email. Forgiveness granted! What a relief. It could have been enough for me, but God wanted reconciliation. At church on Communion Sunday, prior to the start of services, I asked. Well, I couldn't really speak. All I could do was offer my embrace and whisper, "I'm sorry."

They had <u>every right</u> to cling to the hurt. They had <u>every right</u> to hold those wounds and build that little room. <u>They had every right to refuse to be reconciled.</u>

But they didn't claim their rights.

"...blessed are the gentle...the merciful...the peacemakers..." Matthew 5: 5,7,9. "...love does not keep a record of wrongs..." 1 Corinthians 13:5.

Without hesitation, my embrace was returned. Peace and light defeated conflict and dark. Did this erase the memory? No. Was the whole event forgotten in an instant? Of course not. But we <u>chose</u> to exchange the conflict for peace. We set aside our 'right-ness' for His righteousness. We experienced something very dear to God's heart and something He wants us *all* to experience: the complete healing power of both forgiveness *and* reconciliation. Hand in hand it's how He makes us right with each other, and Himself.

"...a new commandment I give to you...love one another...as I have loved you"... John 13:34-35
