

Stick with it!




"If I've learned anything about friendship, it's to hang in, stay connected," says journalist Jon Katz.

GAINING PERSPECTIVE





Ever hear the phrase, In a New York minute? It's a frame of reference, a conceptual scaffold on the use of time. It suggests that people who live there can do more in sixty seconds than others can in hours. People who live in the Tri-state area: New York, New Jersey and Connecticut fall into that rapid paced culture. Long Islanders for example, are always in a hurry to get somewhere or do something. When driving we think in terms of minutes not miles. The advertisement, hurry and get yours before it's too late, cries out to us! But a person who continually overextends them self, inevitably faces physical and emotional exhaustion. Long Islanders dress, talk, drive, work and eat fast. The AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety found that the Northeastern region of the country had the highest number of road rage incidents. Among U.S. cities N.Y.C. has consistently lead the pack for the past three years. If Brooklyn were its own city it would be number two. An underlying cause of road rage is impatience or the desire to get there fast, by whatever means necessary.

A person can become so indifferent to their burden of daily stress that they no longer recognize it. You DVR a favorite TV show because you don't want to waste time on annoying commercials. You wield your remote like a fencing expert parries his sword, vanquishing useless jabber. You experience guilt in a moment of quiet reflection, because it feels like you're wasting time. You bump into yourself going out the door on the way to one of dozens of family activities. You've considered cloning yourself in the hope of doubling personal productivity. If you've experienced all or any of the above symptoms your stress level is teetering on excessive anxiety.

James Banks, a contributing author to Our Daily Bread devotional, wrote about a visit he made to his local Post Office. He was in a hurry because his, to do list was considerable for that day. Things quickly worsened when he discovered he was at the end of a line that stretched from the entry door to the front desk. Frustrated he muttered, "Hurry up and wait." With his hand still on the door an elderly stranger walked up to him to ask for help. The man was struggling with a copier machine that had taken his money but given him nothing in return. James stepped out of line and fixed the problem in ten minutes. As he turned to get back in line he discovered it was gone. His day took a change in direction when he responded to a call for help. Everyone faces situations similar to the one James Banks described. In fact most of us have had a day when we were the stranger desperate for help. Can you remember how it felt when someone reached out to you?

It's amazing how quickly God can transform our perspective? Faster than a New York minute! He presents us with a choice; step away from personal pursuits and make a difference for someone else or continue hammering away at a self absorbed life style.

Helping others is a two way cure, it not only helps the one in need, it blesses the one who steps up to help. We get a kind of euphoric high by doing an act of kindness when no strings are attached. Serving others is God's definition of ministry. God is looking for someone to bless. When we listen to and obey that still small voice inside the returns will be bountiful. Jesus spoke about it in Luke 6:34 (NLT) "Give, and you will receive. Your gift will return to you in full—pressed down, shaken together to make room for more, running over, and poured into your lap. The amount you give will determine the amount you get back."



Isn't that the kind of time investment you want to make? We lose a handle on what's important when our focus shifts to personal goals. God, on the other hand, wants to put us in the position to experience a meaningful, fulfilling life by realigning our perspective. If you're still struggling to find the time to get it all done, why not try it God's way. Experience His blessings by dedicating time to others. You won't have to look far to find opportunities, in fact now that you're aware of how it works, expect Him to bring them right to your door step.




