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TIME AND TIDE



There is a time and place for everything or is there? *Time and tide*, the old

adage states, *waits for no man*. Time is our most precious commodity because we are only allotted so much of it. When our time is up it's up. No amount of begging, bartering or finagling will replenish the sands of life's

hour glass. On May 16th, I. M. Pei, one of the most revered architects in the world, died at his home in Manhattan. He was 102 and my college roommate's next door neighbor. I.M. had a very long and illustrious life but his time was up. If you're still with me at this point you're thinking, this all sounds too fatalistic. But hold on, for the person whose life belongs to God, time constitutes an entirely different equation.

The older I get the faster time seems to move. At times I feel like a spectator standing on the side lines watching my days and weeks dissolve into a vortex. I tried to get a handle on it, as I took down last year's wall calendar replacing it with the new edition. Emerging from my winter's hibernation, I determined I would mentally slow down the rapid passage of time. I was going to savor the first day of spring, revel in the steadily increasing day light and warming temperatures but despite my best efforts time refused to cooperate.

Every person eventually reaches a reflective crossroad in life when they ask the question — What is this life really about? Even the most successful people experience that empty, hollow feeling, that missing element that has somehow eluded them. Have we made good use of the time that was allotted to us? As the years pile up there's a greater urgency to make better use of whatever time we have left. Eugene Peterson writes: *God is the living center of everything we are and everything we do.* He is before, behind, above and beneath everything. If we separate any part of our lives from Him, we're left holding an empty bag. Apart from Him, nothing can stand on its own as good in and of itself.

Now you might be thinking but I'm a Christian, I've given my heart and life to God. Why should I still experience that eerie feeling that I've missed something? The writer of Ecclesiastes asks and answers that question, relating how the pursuit of happiness without God is like taking religion out of context. Perhaps it's time we get a fresh perspective on our relationship with God. Is it inclusive or exclusive? Is He included in your daily thoughts and actions?

Do you actively consult Him when making decisions or choices or is He relegated to a once a week Sunday consultation? When we exclude God from our daily living we are pursuing happiness without wholeness. This kind of approach will leave even the supposedly devout believer with a sense of futility or as Solomon quipped, with nothing but smoke.

Ecclesiastes states that there is a time for everything: A time to be born and a time to die, a time to cry and to laugh, a time to hold and a time to let go ... When God is front and center in our lives we discover these times are not opposing forces, they complement and complete each other. It turns out the passage of time does more than rack up years; they have the potential to produce Godly wisdom. All relationships either develop or degrade and we have the opportunity to develop a relationship with the wisest, most powerful being in the universe.

If you're like me you think about the numbers of people who have past in and out of our lives. Good relationships require a give and take kind of sharing. When relationships become friendships, not only do we learn from the other person, we also learn about ourselves. A relationship with God is no different. It requires conversation, you speaking to Him (prayer) and you listening to Him (reading His Word - the Bible). God wants to be an integral part of those Ecclesiastical cycles of your life. The alternative is *nothing but smoke*.

Wherever you sit in the spectrum of time, just getting started or feeling like it's all winding down know this, God has a specific design for your life from start to finish. Whether you're just starting to figure it out or wondering if your best days are behind you, God's message to you is one of inclusion not exclusion. If that hollow pit in the stomach feeling is haunting you it's time to have a serious conversation with your Heavenly Father. *The secret place of the Most High* that David wrote about in Psalm 93 has a seat with your name reserved on it. It's only a prayer away.


Generosity Encouraged 2 Corinthians 9:6-15 NIV

Check out the lists of accusations against us in 2 Corinthians 12:20 and 2 Timothy 3:1-7. No matter how hard we try, we can never measure up to God's holy standard when we attempt it on our own. When we sin, we cannot clean ourselves up but when we repent Jesus says, "Today is a new day! Start over. Try again." He's giving us a new chance, another chance — another opportunity to get it right.

I don't want to do the wrong thing, but I do. I am a mess and utterly wretched!"* However, Paul knew Who to turn to when he needed forgiveness, and he reaped the fruit of repentance, "He makes everything new, even after you mess up, screw up, and fall short."* 2 Corinthians 5:17-22. Today, if you're feeling the weight of sin and the Holy Spirit is calling you to repentance, don't hesitate to act. A brand-new beginning, a fresh start, a do-over, a clean blank slate awaits!





- •Walker Bag Ministry. People who rely on walkers often find it difficult to carry personal items. Sew bags that fit on walkers so handicapped people can transport a purse, book, cell phone or other personal items.
- •Baby Clothes Ministry: Sew blankets and infant-sized clothing for those with limited means. Corinne Franco
