A lot, as it turns out! The Bible recounts several instances when the name of a person or place changed.

God changed the name of:

- 1. Abram (Exalted father) to Abraham (Father to many) Genesis 17:5
- 2. Sarai (Princess) to Sarah (Princess-who is the mother of many) Genesis 17:15
- 3. Jacob (Heel-holder, supplanter) to Israel (One who contends, strives, or fights with God) Genesis 32:28
- 5. Saul (Asked for or Prayed for) to Paul (Small or Humble) Acts 13:13
- 6. Simon (He has heard) to Peter (Rock/Stone) Matthew 16:18 Each name change came with a turning point in the life of that person. Their new name would reflect their new identity and purpose in God's plans.

Geographical names changed because of some notable event or happening. Genesis 21:31, Genesis 33:17, Joshua 7:26, 1 Chronicles 13:11, 2 Samuel 5:20&1 Chronicles 14:11, Judges 15:19.

An Earth Day Reflection

At the end of April, retired astronaut and NASA explorer Michael Collins passed away at the age of 90. He of course was one of the three astronauts of the Apollo 11 space mission, which was the first space flight to land humans on the Moon. Michael Collins never stepped foot on the Moon; he was piloting the command module in order to pick up Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin once they returned from the surface of the Moon. The fiftieth anniversary of the lunar landing was only a couple years ago, and Michael Collins reflected on the mission at a Kennedy Library event. What he reflected on, however, was not the moon. "Compared to the view of the Earth, I thought the Moon was nothing . . . the Earth was just gorgeous. Tiny little shiny blue and white, a smear of rust across it that we call the continents, a glorious sight."

Another former astronaut from another lunar mission had a similar kind of reaction.

Frank Borman, the mission commander of the Apollo 8 space mission, had an unexpected encounter with the Earth. The mission was to orbit the Moon, and in that the astronauts were successful, but the highlight of the mission was what they saw from their lunar orbit; Borman witnessed the Earth rising from the lunar horizon. The crew took a number of photographs of the event; one in particular is called Earthrise, and it is one of the most influential photographs ever taken. Borman later reflected, "It was small enough you could cover it with your thumbnail. The dearest things in my life were back on the Earth. That was the high point of the flight for me."



I say all this because these two men were in a position where they had this unique perspective of the Earth. We just finished up a Bible study on the book of Colossians, and I was reminded of how different perspectives can in a way strengthen our faith. Paul writes in Chapter 1 of Jesus: "He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in Him all things in heaven and on earth were created . . . all things have been created through Him and for Him. He is before all things and in Him all things hold together." What Paul is describing is almost a cosmic perspective of Christ; it's like he's describing Jesus from the lunar orbit.

It sounds so simple, but at the same time it is so radical, that all things hold together in Christ. The dearest things in our lives are all bound up in Him. The very Earth that Frank Borman could obscure with a thumbnail was created not only through Jesus Christ, but also *for* Jesus Christ. "The earth is the Lord's and the fulness therein." As scary and crazy and dysfunctional as our day to day lives have been this year or so plus, I take comfort in this: that everything belongs to Christ, that He has not forgotten us, and that He has called us out of this earth in order for us to reclaim it for Him.

The Farsighted Approach

"True prayer is neither a mere mental exercise nor a vocal performance. It is far deeper than that - it is spiritual transaction with the Creator of Heaven and Earth." - Charles Spurgeon



When was the last time God answered your prayer in the exact manner in which it was requested? If you're like most of us the answer is probably never. Ok, don't declare me a heretic just yet. I'm not suggesting God doesn't answer prayer; on the contrary, the Lord is far more faithful in His response to our prayers than we deserve. I'm simply echoing the prophet Isaiah as he states the very words of God. "My thoughts are not your thoughts," says the LORD, "and my ways are far beyond anything you could imagine." Isa 55:8 (NLT) It seems God is up to something greater than our near sighted, singular requests. When difficulty and dilemma threaten our sense of security, He is poised to hear our prayers. It's during dark moments of uncertainty that our faith grows the most. This is when our prayers become powerful and effective. The prayer of a person living right with God is something powerful to be reckoned with. James 5:16 (MSG) God's answer to this kind of prayer is far greater in scope than the original petition.

David's story in 1Samuel, Chapters 27 - 30, provides a, *case in point*, scenario. David had been living in Philistine territory under the protection of king Achish, away from King Saul's relentless pursuit. When Achish told David he and his men would have to join him in a battle against the armies of Israel, David quickly agreed. God however, who works by insight not eye sight caused the Philistine commanders to reject Achish plan, keeping David from taking actions that would have ruined his future as Israel's next king.

When David and his men returned to their base camp they found it deserted and burning. Amalekite raiders had taken everything including wives, children, and livestock. Looking for someone to blame, David's men were about to stone him. *But David found strength in the LORD his God. 1 Sam 30:5* (NLT) David prayed fervently asking God two questions: Should I chase after the raiders? Will I catch them? God answered with an affirmative YES. But God's farsighted plan was far more encompassing, than David's prayer. Not only had God protected David from action that would have ruined his future, he sent him back in time to overtake the Amalekites, rescue his family, and send some of the additional plunder to the towns of Judah, as an installment of good will for the future.

As He so often does, God turned a disaster into a victory. It seems He delights in doing these kinds of things for His children and He's ready to do it for you. Whatever the problem you're staring down: illness, financial uncertainty, political pressure, family tragedy, or fear of the unknown, nothing is too difficult for the God of the Universe. If God had a personal business card it would read: *No job is too difficult*. Maybe you're reading this and thinking, but I'm in no position to make such a request of God. If that's your mind set let me assure you, you're in the perfect position. God's farsighted planning has accounted for this season of your life. The Holy Spirit is calling you by name, ready to receive and answer your prayer in a way you might think unimaginable. This problem you're facing is an opportunity in disguise. Listen to God's Word spoken by of the prophet Jeremiah: 'Call to me and I will answer you. I'll tell you marvelous and wondrous things that you could never figure out on your own.' Jeremiah 33:3 (MSG) Stop listening to that voice of condescension that tells you it's too late. Listen instead to the voice of hope that tells you His vision for you is far greater than your own.
