CHALLENGE

It's summertime once again, and do you know what that means? Summer reading! It's the perfect time

of the year to get out the lawn chairs, make some sun tea, set up the bocce court, and read an enjoyable book outdoors. I think we

tend to overlook the importance of reading today, due in no small part to the vast number of streaming services vying for our attention and dollars. But books have long since played an important role in our Christian heritage. Saint Augustine recounts in his Confessions how he heard a child chanting from a neighboring house "Take up and read," which prompted him to pick up St. Paul's letter to the Romans and open it. He read the first line on the page: "Let us walk honestly, as in the day; not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness, not in strife and envying" (Rom. 13:13). It changed his life, and in doing so changed the course of Christian history.

I thought about this fact: how no other book has revolutionized the world as has the Bible. One little verse changed "the course of human events" not just once, but again and again. Martin Luther was struggling to understand the idea of God's righteousness, when he wrote that, by the mercy of God, "I began to understand that the righteousness of God is that by which the righteous lives by a gift of God, namely by faith . . . [it is] the work of God, that is what God does in us, the power of God, with which he makes us wise, the strength of God, the salvation of God, the glory of God." Luther's subsequent writings and teachings on justification by faith shook the Church and led to Reformation.

It's on a smaller scale, however, that the importance of the Scriptures can be most clearly seen; that is, the Bible has shaped the course of individual human lives, yours and mine included. In 1967, country music legend Johnny Cash had a conversion experience; after years of drug and alcohol abuse, Cash decided to end his life by crawling deep into a cave where no one would find him. God spoke to him while he was in the cave, and Cash was changed; he crawled out of the cave, sought out treatment for his dependencies, got married to June Carter, and recorded his hit record "At Folsom Prison." It was toward the end of his life where he made the decision to record the entire New Testament; it's over 19 hours, and worth every minute. He said "I did it with a great deal of joy, because I love the Word." The Man in Black was shaped by the Word of God.

Lastly, William Tyndale, English Bible translator and scholar, was arrested for opposing Henry VIII's annulment and subsequent marriage to Anne Boleyn. He was holed up in a prison cell in a drafty castle near Brussels. One letter of his survived from his imprisonment; in it he writes "Above all, I beg and entreat . . . with the lord commissary, that he would allow me the use of my Hebrew Bible and Hebrew Grammar. . ." Even in his last days, awaiting execution, his focus was on reading and translating the Word of God for the people of God.

I hope you all get some quality reading done this summer. I have a list of books I'd like to get through – murder mysteries, novels, and pulp thrillers. But I hope you also get a chance to read the Bible. Maybe not all the way through, but enough so that God speaks to your heart. Or maybe plug in your earbuds and listen to Johnny Cash read the Bible. Do it with great joy, because you love the Word. Jon Ollett



Blinded by the Night By Sue Cerruto



A recent trip to the optometrist resulted in a referral to an ophthalmologist, where exam results gave two diagnoses: small cataracts and the label "glaucoma-suspect". I was handed an information sheet with reassurances about early treatments and warnings about ignoring the conditions. Eyes still dilated I drove home, thankful that the disappearing sun was giving way to the semi-dark of twilight.

If I were to list abilities I would never want to lose, my vision would be high on the list. Everything would change dramatically and, from my initial, knee-jerk reaction point of view, not for the better. Later that evening, on my knees before God, I asked for faith. I asked for healing. I asked for wisdom and strength and trust and peace and spiritual vision. Finally, I ended my prayer with "...not my will but Thine be done"¹ because, ultimately, everything about me is in His hands.

As unsettling as physical blindness might be, spiritual blindness is even worse. Unlike some well-known repressive societies, we who have the luxury and benefit of owning a Bible, who can freely gather in person in His name every Sunday to meet and pray openly, wear our faith visibly on our clothing and in our home decorations, download Christian-themed apps on our cell phones, and walk about in this country relatively free from persecution (although we shouldn't take this for granted much longer) are so prone to treating our constitutionally guaranteed God-given Christian liberties lightly and carelessly. We ignore them when they're inconvenient or they conflict with our personal agendas. Paying homage to the god of safety instead of the God of peace², we let fear rule in our hearts and minds, we act accordingly, and we put ourselves in danger of growing increasingly blind to the lowering spiritual darkness that is descending on this nation and in this world. The only way to avoid being blinded by the night is to embrace the Light of the gospel³, the Lord Jesus Christ.⁴

SPRING CLEANING



My room isn't dirty, I just have everything on display, like a museum, was the ten year old's reply to his mother's request to straighten his room.

Imagine arriving at your vacation destination to find your room a jumbled pile of chaos. After a collective gasp, you race with your spouse to the front desk, ready to unleash the tongue lashing of the century. No one wants to discover their vacation get away is a cluttered mess. You took the vacation, at least in part, to escape the daily barrage of nonstop, mind numbing clutter.

Isn't this the situation we've all been living with for the past two years? It seems everyone is searching, hoping for a sense of normality. Except we've lived so long with intrusive clutter we no longer know what it looks like. How do we get back our old lives ... do we press on moving forward or retreat, trying to recapture what's been lost? While we wait for an answer, we continue to sort through the piles of information and disinformation we've accumulated: the inclusion of "woke" curriculum into school curriculum, the vacillating public health directives and mandates, the never ending debate over governmental overreach or public welfare, to mention just a few. If you're a thinking person, you've discovered that trying to disseminate fact from fiction to get to the truth is no easy task.

Case in point, the recent premature "leak" of the U.S. Supreme Court decision on the 49 year old case of *Roe V Wade*. How did the leak happen? Why did it happen and what are the repercussions and hateful eruptions that followed it? What is and isn't significant about the illegal and potentially dangerous precedent this leak has caused?

The shortest book in the Old Testament is the book of Obadiah. Neatly tucked away between Amos and Jonah, the prophet Obadiah has a lot to say in the 21 verses that make up his single chapter book. Obadiah's message is anything but insignificant and might even help clear away some of our 21st Century clutter.

A hurried reading of Obadiah might leave you with the conclusion that Edom is the clear villain and Israel the victim of their injustice. But Obadiah reveals that God's chosen people are about to find themselves in a new context and vocation; using the reins of government to administer God's justice in a, *just manner*. The oppressors, are about to become the oppressed, with God declaring that he would judge Edom for its cruelty. Think of some of the prayers you've mouthed to God in your desire to see things change. Many of us have been praying against an attack on our personal freedom, including the right to live our lives according to God given directives of holiness. But perhaps a second read of Obadiah, influenced and directed by Holy Spirit, might help us to clear away the clutter of personal prejudice.

God wanted to break the cycle of injustice by using His people to judge righteously, allowing Him to rule through them. Does God still deliver His people from oppression? Does He still work through people to accomplish His righteous purpose? Our job as believers is to seek that purpose. Everything starts with a prayer that seeks to align our hearts with His, but that's the beginning not the end of our responsibility.

Obadiah's final prophetic word had the intention of God's chosen people taking a major step away from the centuries of hate and rivalry. Clearly God wanted His people involved and informed, accepting the responsibility of governing their former enemies righteously as God desired and stated in the final verse of Obadiah.

Imagine the kind of revival that would break forth if we combined God's Old Testament directive to Obadiah, to lead and govern righteously, with Jesus' New Testament command, to love absolutely. Let's do some spring cleaning, clearing away all the unsettling clutter, choosing instead to listen to the heart instructions of the Holy Spirit. We'll hear those instructions in prayer and find those directives in the Bible, God's inspired Word.

THOUGHTS ON PRAYER

As I write this, we are midway in "Praying our way to Pentecost". I hope that you have been reading the devotions and taking time to sit quietly before our Lord. As Pastor Vinnie has told us, if you miss a day, it is okay but try to keep it as regular as you can.

All through the Bible we are called to pray and to be patient as we await the answers we are seeking. We have confidence that God hears both our audible prayers and those that are in our hearts. Often times those prayers don't have the answers we asked for but they are always the right answers according to His plan for our lives.



Sometimes our prayers are answered very quickly but other times it can even take years before we have the direction and hope that we seek. In "Streams in the Desert", which is a devotional I read daily, I came across something that we often forget with regard to prayer. The following is something I think we all need to be reminded of. The Scripture reference is Daniel 10:12-13.

"This passage is a wonderful teaching on prayer and shows us the direct hindrance Satan can be in our lives. Daniel had fasted and prayed for twenty-one difficult days. As far as we can tell from the biblical account, the difficulty came not because Daniel was not a good person nor because his prayer was not right but because of a special attack from Satan.

The Lord had sent His angelic messenger to tell Daniel that his prayer was answered the moment he began to pray but the good angel was hindered by an evil angel who met him along the way and wrestled with him. This conflict occurred in the heavens yet Daniel experienced the same kind of conflict here on earth as he agonized in prayer (Eph.6:12). Daniel was nearly defeated and Satan would have been glad to kill him but God would not allow anything to come upon Daniel beyond what he could bear.

Many prayers of believers are hindered by Satan. Yet you do not need to fear when your unanswered prayers are piling up for soon they will break through like a flood. When that happens, not only will your answers flow through but they will also be accompanied by new blessings." From a sermon given by Charles E. Cowman.

A Personal Note about Prayer

Paul admonished us in 1 Thess. 5:16-18, "Rejoice always, <u>pray without ceasing</u>, in everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."

I have experienced some really good times in prayer. I have heard the voice of the Lord in his Word and in thought. I have received direction, guidance, and insight from Him in my times of prayer. However, these have been specific times and occurrences. I cannot boast about my prayer life in general. I never could relate to Paul's command which is the will of God for me to pray without ceasing. My life is so busy that I can't stay still long enough to really focus on personal prayer.

As I hope you all know, we have engaged in a special emphasis on Prayer throughout the Nazarene denomination. We have handed out prayer journals with a daily reading, a prayer, and a place for you to write your thoughts. I hope you are taking advantage of this tool. The program is called, Half-Million Mobilization. It was designed to get 500,000 Nazarenes praying daily from May 1 to June 5 (Pentecost). It was put in place at this time in our nation when things are or seem to be out of control on many levels. Prayer is our only hope for many reasons.

People think, "You're a pastor. You have to have a great prayer life." While I pray in public and am requested to pray for people all the time, this has nothing to do with my personal prayer life. This emphasis on prayer has helped me personally, and I know it will help anyone who dives into it also.

When I first looked at the prayer journal and read the first two days, I was mostly disappointed. I was thinking, like the old Wendy's commercial, "Where's the beef?" It seemed so simple and didn't have much substance for me. However, I stuck with it and continue to do so. I have been very affected by the simple and short lessons each day. I have been especially reminded during this effort of the importance of the Holy Spirit's involvement in our personal prayer time. I have changed the ways I pray as I read the daily devotional part. God has been reviving my spirit through my times of reading, reflecting, and praying along with the journal.

I had a pastor long ago say that when you sit down to pray, the parade is going to start. It is a parade of distractions and will be a different length parade for each individual, but if you wait long enough for the parade to end, you will be in the presence of God and your prayers will have substance. My head is always on the move and my parade can be long at times. It is hard to wait for the end of the parade.

Be diligent. Prayer is a discipline. Prayer is our power. Prayer is our connection to God directly. Eventually, you will get to a point when you find yourself praying all day long without realizing it. That is praying without ceasing. You may not be there yet, and that's OK. Start small, but start somewhere.

God is waiting to hear from you and maybe more importantly, to speak to you. Prayer is a two-way conversation with Almighty God. We all have requests, and we need answers. He can't answer if we are not listening for Him to speak. He wants to give you the answers to your prayers. Pray and Listen!
