Who's Packing your Parachute?

Did you know that Paul the Apostle wrote thirteen of the New Testament letters? Some were written to individuals like Timothy, others to churches like Ephesus. All of them contained life changing power, and all are still impacting life and society twenty centuries later, what a legacy. I've wondered if Paul ever questioned God as to why it was necessary for him to spend so many years in prison, under house arrest. He had given up everything to serve Jesus, wasn't this a funny kind of a way to reward him? But if Paul's movements hadn't been restricted by jail, would those letters have ever been written? Think, for example, about the impact the epistles (letters) we call Romans and Ephesians have had on your life.



Pilot Charles Plumb successfully flew 74 combat missions in Vietnam. On his final mission, he was shot down and forced to parachute into enemy hands where he spent the next six years in a Vietnamese prison. Years after his release he met a man he didn't recognize but who knew him. "I packed your parachute!" the man explained. As they shook hands, he added, "I guess it worked!" Since his release, Charles Plumb has been an inspirational speaker, sharing his story with hundreds of people and often asking the question, "Who's packing your parachute?"

Let me throw out a couple of questions. First, who is the person or persons in your life that have encouraged, strengthened, and maybe even rescued you? Second, whose parachute have you been packing? This is the call that every believer has on his or her life. In Matthew 25, Jesus' parable of the talents has little to do with money investment, and everything to do with the Kingdom of God; the key commodity being souls not coins. Ministry it turns out, isn't just for clergy. A minister is one who *ministers* or leads a person to the place where they can be directly touched by God. We're called to influence lives; and not just the people who haven't yet given their heart over to Jesus. Salvation is the beginning of the journey not the end. Our words and deeds may very well prove to be the packed parachute that forever changes a life. Your personal involvement (ministry) may start with words, but graduates into personal interaction that casts aside the safe distance we keep between ourselves and others. If you're feeling powerless as a believer, ask God to remind you of the people you have encouraged in the past and also those whose chutes are still needing to be packed. The fact that you're reading this right now is evidence in itself that God is reaching out to you step up for others, those who have either lost their spiritual compass or have yet to find Him. Get ready to pack that parachute.

It's Not What You Eat, Or Is It?

All these celebrations, and the ones with our own families and friends, make me thankful that Jesus tells us in Matthew 15:11 "...it's not what enters the mouth that defiles a person, but what comes out of it that does." Of course, all that 'entering' can be an 'over-doing' and that's something else to consider, but Jesus says what comes out of our mouths reflects what's in our hearts. A defiled heart will eventually give evidence of its condition in our words.



However, there is one meal that, if we eat of it unworthily, we will be "guilty of the body and blood of the Lord". In first Corinthians 11, Paul reminds us of the correct way to take communion: the Lord's Supper.

First, let's back up to chapter 6. Paul reminds the church of the depraved and sinful lives from which they had already been cleansed. They were believers, but they were facing some internal divisions, strife, and controversies which Paul had to address because they weren't dealing with it on their own. Moreover, he severely chastised them for their very serious moral failures and the fact that they were bringing all their backslidden sinfulness to the most important meal believers share. Moving back to chapter 11, he reminds us that the taking of Holy Communion was, and still is, so serious that, if we dishonor God by eating and drinking with unrepentant hearts, unconfessed sins, and inappropriate attitudes and actions, we bring judgment upon ourselves.

This holiday season, as we take care to make special meals, dress ourselves appropriately for receiving guests or being one, and pay careful attention to our table manners, let's give the best of what we do to the Lord Jesus when we gather for communion. After all, we're practicing for the most exciting meal awaiting the church; the wedding supper of the Lamb!

Christmas At Home

"There's no place like home." Dorothy's iconic line from the Wizard of Oz conjures up a feeling of wistfulness in all of us about the meaning and comfort of home. It is something that I have been thinking about recently. My brother bought a condominium in Chicago and my sister bought a house in Connecticut this past year. Of course, a house does not constitute a home; there is a sense of belonging that goes along with home that is not necessarily wrapped up in a house or even a location. But even still, I have been thinking about and pondering what it means to be home, in both a physical and a metaphysical sense.

This subject corresponds nicely with the advent season that is upon us once again. At Christmas, we celebrate Christ being born as a human baby, the infinite God coming to earth in finite flesh. There is a verse that brought the Christmas message "home" to me. It is a verse from the first chapter of the Gospel of John, and I have read it many times over; but as I was reading Leon Morris's commentary The Gospel According to John (in the New International Commentary on the New Testament) a new way of looking at the verse was explained to me. "He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him" (John 1:11, NIV). Leon Morris explained that in the Greek, the phrase "that which was his own" is better translated as "to his own home." Suddenly a lightbulb when off in my head. It was as if Jesus came to unlock his house, but his own family dead bolted the door from the inside.



I love Christmastime, but I was reminded how there is an air of tragedy that goes along with it too. Yes, Jesus came to earth, but he was met immediately with resistance; his home was set against him from the beginning, and it is true even now. There is a sickness of commercialism and materialism that goes hand in hand with Christmas that is diametrically opposed to Jesus and the Gospel. I heard on the radio an advertisement from Amazon; it was a song sung that celebrated all the "stuff" we

need to buy for ourselves and for others. It is no wonder that we do not feel that sense of belonging that goes along with home; as a society there is a deep-seated restlessness that we seek to ignore with material, politics, careers, family obligations, even spirituality. But that restlessness can only be alleviated when we unlock the door and let Jesus in to what was rightfully his in the first place. When we accept and celebrate Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior of our lives, the rightful God who came in flesh to rescue his own, then we will know that true sense of belonging.

Our restless hearts will have finally found our home.

Alabaster funds are to be used for new churches to purchase a property or church building, purchase or build a church parsonage, building a church or converting of a property into a church gathering space and the building of missionary homes and build or repurpose buildings on Bible college campuses. It's amazing what your coins can do!

We've filled shoeboxes for Samaritan's Purse Operation Christmas Child that reaches children and families around the globe. We also sponsor a child through Compassionate Ministries – Adan in Pakistan.

Closer to home we held a VBS program and picnic to reach out to our neighborhood. The VBS offering this year was collected for Lighthouse Mission in Bellport serving an even larger portion of the surrounding area. We have provided food on a weekly basis through our own Food Panty to those in need and provided Thanksgiving meals to numerous families.

I say all this to encourage you and let you know that your giving is more than putting money in a basket! It is Spreading the Good News of the Gospel through compassion and making Jesus REAL to many. We are a giving and compassionate church.

Of course we do need money to run our 3 church buildings, run programs and pay salaries. The Church Board will be meeting soon to compose a budget for the New Year.
